Innovative Teaching Methods/best practices:

Poetry reading sessions, workshops and other activities:

Samrita Sinha:

"Tea, Coffee and Literature": Every year, the SYBA students are invited to a tea party where along with refreshments, discussions on the background concepts from the syllabus are held. Students were expected to come prepared with their thoughts on the texts and concepts like African-American Poetry of the 20th century, Jewish-American Literature, Literature of the Chinese Diaspora in America and Literature of the Indian Diaspora in America.

"Literature Beyond the Classroom": Ms Sinha collaborated with Dr Tina Chakravarty from the BMM department to design the programme "Literature Beyond the Classroom" in which SYBA English and SYBMM students were encouraged to form a poetry reading club. The students met as per their convenience, and read and discussed poetry. They were also encouraged to read out their own poetry. Preference was given to regional poetry and marginalised poetic voices. These sessions were held in open spaces outside the classrooms. The quieter students of the class benefited a lot from these interactive sessions.

In the Communication Skills classes, students were asked to write letters to each other in class in order to facilitate learning via their peer group. Additionally, four clubs, namely, Reading club, Movie Club, Cookery Club and Debate Club were created to encourage more class participation among students and to hone their public speaking skills. Elected coordinators chose books, movies, recipes and topics for the class to discuss.

Nishtha Dev:

For the unit on report writing on Communication Skills, Ms Dev asked her students to write reports based on the crimes and the ensuing investigation depicted in an episode from *Castle*, for a fictional newspaper. The class was divided into groups for the class presentation and feedback was provided to them.

She also organised a dance workshop in her Communication Skills class as an activity for report writing (activity reports).

Debates and creative writing sessions were organised to celebrate National Integration Day and Constitution Day.

Dr Elwin Susan John:

Clubs like Film Club, Vocab Club and Debate Club were created in order to help students hone their public speaking and writing skills.

Students were encouraged to draw inspiration from the birds on campus and to compose poetry. Their poetry was e-published in a volume titled *Ruminations*.

Silent movies were screened to improve their dialogue writing and creative writing skills.

Students were asked to write letters to each other in class in order to facilitate learning via their peer group.

A/V aids, ICT, film screenings:

Ms Sinha screened films like *Days That Shook the World* and *Three Iranian Women* to encourage discussion on issues like gender and global politics. The film *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof* was screened to help students link it with the play *Death of a Salesman*. She screened documentaries, Satyajit Ray's films and contemporary Bollywood films in her Mass Communication classes. The silent animation film *Paperman* was screened as part of the exercise on dialogue writing. Students were asked to imagine and write the dialogue for the film.

Ms Dev screened old advertisements and scenes from *Hum Log* in her Mass Communication class.

Dr John made a detailed PPT on the history of English literature (which included the information on the important events of the era, the prominent writers of each period, their works and the popular genres of the times) for Paper IV. She screened the films *Spotlight* and *Snowden* for her Mass Communication students. The screenings were followed by interactive sessions on censorship and freedom of expression. The National Theatre's production of Oliver Goldsmith's *She Stoops to Conquer* was screened. The lectures on Unit II of Paper VI ("Postmodernism and Popular Culture") were supported by powerpoint presentations.

Handouts:

Student presentations:

Ms Sinha encouraged the Mass Communication students to make presentations on the history of radio and Indian cinema. She asked the TYBA S/M students to make presentations on the theoretical aspects of modernism and postmodernism and on short story writers of the 20th century.

Dr John encouraged the students of Mass Communication to make presentations on the history of print media and the role of journalism in contemporary India. TYBA students made presentations on "Coffee Houses in 17th and 18th century English Culture" and "Fashion in 18th Century England".

<u>Contact groups</u>: The TYBA English S/M students met their mentors once a week to review their academic progress and to ask them questions related to the syllabus, the writing of answers, reference work etc.

<u>Google groups</u>: Google groups were used to share academic material, announcements related to departmental and college activities, information on job and internship opportunities, and cultural events held in the city.

<u>Unsupervised tests</u>: Unsupervised tests were conducted for the TYBA English S/M class.

Texts for IAs (FYBA English, TYBA English etc.) are taken from outside the syllabus.

<u>N-List</u>: FYBA, SYBA and TYBA students were asked to activate their N-List accounts at the start of the academic year. They were encouraged to make use of the facility.

Syllabus formulation:

The Department of English prepared the draft syllabi for the SYBA Mass Communication and English courses as part of the syllabus revision process under autonomy.

Paper-setting and Moderation:

Members of the department were appointed as paper-setters and examiners under autonomy.

Ms Sinha was invited by the Department of English, Jai Hind College, to be the moderator for the paper on Victorian Literature in October 2019.

Ms Dev was invited by Jai Hind College, Mumbai, as a moderator for Business Communication, Nineteenth Century Literature and TYBA Popular Culture papers.

Dr John was invited by Jai Hind College, Mumbai, for the moderation of the semester-end answer papers.

Department Activities:

<u>Matribhasha Diwas and Marathi Bhasha Divas:</u> The department celebrated Matribhasha Diwas and Marathi Bhasha Divas in February 2020 by organising exercises and events in the Communication Skills classes.

<u>Peace Week</u>: The Department of English in association with Story Circus, a Mumbai-based theatre production company, organised a solo theatre piece by Ulka Mayur titled "Cast Off All Shame" in the A V Hall on August 9, 2019. Dr John was the event coordinator.

<u>Ananya</u>: The department organised a performance titled "Ramji Aayenge", an inter-textual adaptation of Samuel Beckett's *Waiting for Godot* and Ramayana's "Kishkindha Kaand", in association with Mr Abhinav Grover, founder of Be Taal, a Mumbai-based theatre company, on November 29, 2019. Ms Dev was the event coordinator.

Conferences/seminars organised:

The Departments of History and English, Sophia College, in collaboration with Literature Live! 360@ Campus organised a two-day international conference on "Mythology in Indian Culture, Literature and Art" on January 30 and 31, 2020.
