The event propelled the writers to step out of their comfort zone to express themselves through the given prompt.

The members were asked to write an account in not more than five hundred words of the life experience of their favourite character that supposedly got to live in their own shoes (the participant's) for a day. It helped the writers to connect with fictional characters on a personal level which served as a great tool to hone their writing skills as well as the ability to think deeper.

Submission period – 24th September to 27th September 2021.

The participants were required to send in their written material **via Google form** which was attached to the message that had been circulated around. The participants were given a choice if they would want to publish their work on the ELS blog.

1984 by George Orwell Book-Discussion

The English Literary Society and the International Relations Club of Sophia College collaborated and held a book discussion on the **8th of October 2021**, on the video conferring platform **Zoom**. Chapter 1 from the novel *1984* by George Orwell was discussed. The discussion lasted for one and a half hours between 6 pm and 7:30 pm. Many creative and enlightening interpretations were provided by the participants which ranged from the historical setting of the book to details within the first chapter. The session was animatedly moderated by executives Haritha Vattolikal and Rhea Kotrashetti of ELS and IRC respectively. We saw active participation of approximately 12 people and a total attendance of 100+ members.





Monologue Circle (November Edition)

English Literary Society and Sophia College English Dramatics Association collaborated to organise the event, Monologue Circle (November Edition). The emotion assigned to the participants for this edition was wonder (Adbhuta Ras). For this event, one participant (actor) had to enact a monologue written by another participant (author). They could either send in a write-up for the event, participate as an actor or select both options. Submission forms were circulated through the groups and a deadline of 26 November was assigned for the same.

There were 10 actors and 9 writers which made **19 active participants** presenting their powerpacked **performances in front of the audience.**

Junior executive Riddhi Tiwari from ELS and junior executive Disha Mukhoupadhyay from SCEDA warmed everyone with their hosting on November 30th, the date of the event. The actors and the writers could interact with each other after the actor enacted their monologue which opened a space for discussion. Writers were given a choice of whether they wanted their monologue to be discussed or not. There was spectacular participation from both sides thus, making it a memorable collaboration.



It's Our Turn Now (Taylor's Version)

On the occasion of Taylor Swift's birthday, the English Literary Society of Sophia College, Autonomous held a submission-based event to celebrate her contribution to the songwriting and music industry.
